Another example is the hybrid piano, which combines the mechanics of an acoustic piano with digital sound generation and features. Additionally, MIDI controllers and certain electronic instruments can be considered hybrid due to their ability to interface with both acoustic and digital systems.

1. The Noori: This instrument, created by Kavish Seth, merges elements of the sitar, rabab, and guitar. It features a sitar/guitar-like soundboard and a rabab-like neck with 14 strings that produce both melodic and resonant sounds. Its ability to emulate various instruments and its lighter weight make it a hybrid in both sound and practicality.

2. Hybrid Pianos: These instruments bridge the gap between acoustic and digital pianos. They utilize the mechanics of an acoustic piano for playing feel and touch sensitivity, while incorporating digital sound generation and features like MIDI connectivity and recording capabilities. Some hybrid pianos even replicate the vibrations and resonance of a traditional acoustic piano.
